A letter from the Mayor



As I begin to put my thoughts together on what 2020 gave us, I believe we could all agree this has been a roller coaster ride we have been on for way too long. It is understandable to question if what has taken place in the world this past year really happened. Unfortunately, it did. Yet, our resiliency, our community support for one another, and our faith have seen us through what we can now reflect on was the worst part of the pandemic. The optimism around vaccine distribution in our community, along with statistical data showing improvements in key areas, is growing and helps support the confidence I have that 2021 will be a much different and better year. However, we will still have challenges throughout. Some we already know about and some we have yet to see. But if we remember we have already survived the worst of it, then we can handle the last part of this roller coaster ride knowing it will soon come to an end.

From the start of the pandemic last March, I saw first-hand how dynamic and incredible a team we have here with our City staff and department leaders. It seems like yesterday when we started our first morning meetings around crisis, managing a myriad of occurrences we had never been through before. Procuring supplies for our first responders and City staff, which had become almost impossible to come by, was a priority so that we could continue services to our residents and businesses.

It seems like just yesterday we were having a discussion about keeping - of all things - toilet paper locked up. Then, we forced closures within our City facilities to mitigate the risk to staff and residents with some, like our building rentals, still not available to the public as of today. I can assure you that none of these decisions were - or are - made lightly. They are also not made without input from our key stakeholders at every level. These decisions affected us in many ways, causing a financial burden that will likely linger for years to come. Yet, it pales in comparison to the burden that has been placed on our businesses and residents as we know they were all affected in one way or another.

While the physical impact is still there in several measurements, I have shared before that the mental health and well-being of our community is what concerns me. If you were to take nothing else from this newsletter, my ask of you is to reach out to family, friends, neighbors, and anyone else you might come across. Have the meaningful conversation that asks, "How are you doing?" Let's not just take the first answer given as enough, but ask "No. How are you *really* doing?" Dig deeper to make sure we all understand that, while we have been tested, we will be OK and there is a lot of help and support if they need it. In this newsletter you will see some resources listed to reach out for help. Given all that we have been through it is ok to raise one's hand and say "I need to talk."

One of the toughest challenges we are wrestling as a city leadership team in 2021 is our City events. They have become such an essential fabric of what makes up Walker. Recently, we had to make the tough, yet safe, decision to hold off on our annual Winterfest. Adapting like they always do, our City staff came together with a great idea, introducing our first ever Jingle Bell Lane event. It was socially-distant and safe for all. I must confess that our staff and City Commission, Santa, and even myself needed that just as much as our visiting families did. We know the essential needs of our human interactions has been negatively impacted this last year and seeing all those smiling faces light up was, quite frankly, the best gift we could have received. Building on that, this community knows where there is a will there is a way and we will hold our events.

Currently, it is an extremely difficult time to decide whether we can safely hold our annual Memorial Day Parade, our Summer Concert Series, and other events. We know our annual Easter Egg Hunt is one event that we will not be able to do in the traditional sense, but we are evaluating options of what could we possibly do in its place. We make these decisions with a lot of support from the tremendous team at the Kent County Health Department. The last two years I have written about the opportunities and even challenges with the business growth we are experiencing. One of the bright spots through the pandemic is the enthusiasm and desire from business developers to bring new companies into our City. What has been good to see is the diverse types of new businesses that are looking to call Walker home. While many fall in the category of manufacturing and ‘making things’, we also have companies that provide services and even new types of retail breaking ground.

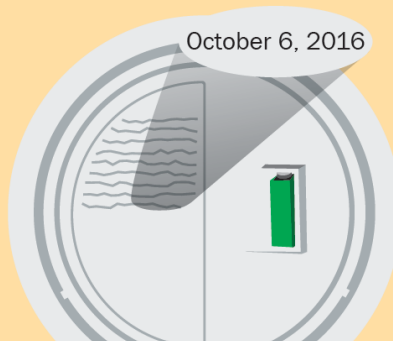
DON'T WAIT - CHECK THE DATE! REPLACE SMOKE ALARMS EVERY 10 YEARS!

1

Remove the smoke alarm from the wall or ceiling.

Look at the back of the alarm for the date of manufacture.

3

Smoke alarms should be replaced 10 years from the date of manufacture.



4

Put the alarm back on the ceiling or wall if it is less than 10 years old.



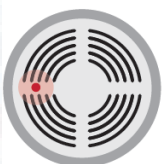
A closed door may slow the spread of smoke, heat and fire.



Test smoke alarms at least once a month by pushing the test button.



If the smoke alarm sounds, get outside and stay outside. Go to your outside meeting place.



Install smoke alarms in every bedroom, outside each separate sleeping area, and on every level of the home, including the basement. Larger homes may need more alarms. For the best protection, make sure all smoke alarms are interconnected. When one sounds, they all sound.



Call the fire department from a cellphone or a neighbor's phone. Stay outside until the fire department says it's safe to go back inside.

BURNING PERMIT



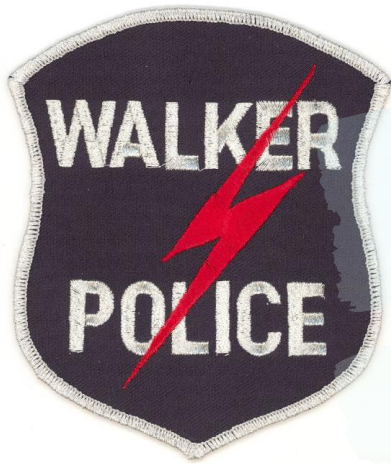
By order of the City of Walker Fire Department, an annual burning permit is required for residential burning of branches and small twigs. No other residential or commercial burning is allowed in the City of Walker. Burning season is April 15 to May 15 and October 15 to November 15 on Mondays, Wednesdays and Saturdays only. You can apply for a permit at www.walker.city. Backyard fire pits or commercial portable fire pits do not require a burn permit for recreational use.

PROOF OF RESIDENCY REQUIRED

PURCHASE LEAF BAGS:

Biodegradable bags can be purchased at the Department of Public Works (DPW) located at 4243 Remembrance RD NW (entrance across from the library) during office hours.

Price: \$.50 per bag or 5 pack for \$2.50

TYPE OF BAGS ACCEPTED:

- Biodegradable
- Plastic bags not accepted. Resident will have to empty the leaves out of the bags

We will also be accepting brush at this location.



MAILBOX REPLACEMENT POLICY:

It is the Department of Public Works policy that any mailbox damaged by snow as a result of plowing or scraping the roadway, is the responsibility of the property owner.

Please check your mailbox post by shaking it back and forth. It should not move. If the post does move you may want to replace it. When the mailbox is damaged by direct contact with our equipment, the Department of Public Works will:

- Repair, if possible or
- Replace with a standard mailbox and post, or
- Compensate owner for damage (\$15.00 for box, \$5.00 for post). Owner is responsible for repair/replace.

Repair and/or replacement of mailbox by Department of Public Works may take several days depending on storm conditions and workload.

ELECTION NEWS

A Special Primary and Special Election have been called by the Governor for the 28th District of the Michigan Senate. This election call is issued for the purpose of filling a vacancy that exists in the Senate caused by the election of Senator Peter MacGregor as the Kent County Treasurer.

August 3, 2021 Special Primary Election Date

November 2, 2021 Special Election Date

Before we know it, we will be rolling into the 2022 Elections, which will include the Michigan House, Senate, all Congressional seats, Governor, Attorney General, Secretary of State and Walker City Elections of Mayor and a Commissioner from each Ward.

REDISTRICTING

Every 10 years, following the census, states must redraw their political lines based on population in a process known as reapportionment. The party actively in charge of state government is responsible for redrawing the lines according to the governing acts. By November 1, 2021, the final maps must be adopted by the Commission and will become law on December 31, 2021. These new district lines will affect several members of the House, Senate, and Congress. Candidates will learn of their new districts in late 2021 and will need to quickly move to campaigning for the 2022 Election.

Who must file:

Every resident or part-year resident of Walker (this includes renters) who had taxable income in 2020 of \$600 or more must file a return. More information on taxable income can be found here: www.walker.city/government/departments/income_tax/income_tax_faqs.php. All Walker addresses have Grand Rapids mailing addresses so please **do not assume you are not a Walker resident based on your mailing address**. Visit the following link on our City website to check whether your address is within the city limits of Walker and click on the Street Directory link on the right side of the page: www.walker.city/government/departments/assessing/index.php. If you have past years of Walker returns that you have forgotten to file, contact the tax department immediately at 616-791-6880. If you file prior year returns and pay the tax and interest due, you may request a waiver of penalty. If the tax department contacts you first regarding unfiled returns, you will not be eligible for a waiver of penalty. We are continuing the process of electronically matching state of Michigan returns filed from a Walker resident address with Walker returns filed. If you have forgotten to file Walker returns from prior years, now is the time to get that cleared up before you receive an assessment from this compliance program.

Estimated Payments

The first quarter estimated payment for 2021 Walker Income Tax is also due April 30, 2021. If your employer does not withhold Walker Income Tax or you have non-wage income (rental income, capital gains, premature pension distributions, etc.) that is subject to tax and you think you may owe more than \$100 with your 2021 return, you must make quarterly estimated payments. The 2021 Quarterly Estimated payment vouchers with instructions can be found:

You must pay in at least 70% of your current or prior year liability (whichever is lower) through timely estimates, credits or withholding to avoid receiving a bill for penalty and interest for underpayment of estimated tax. If you need help calculating safe estimates, please call us for assistance at 616-791-6880.

Please note that paying all four 2021 quarterly estimates with the fourth quarter voucher due January 31, 2022 may result in a bill for penalty and interest for failure to pay timely estimates.

E-FILE YOUR WALKER INCOME TAX RETURN

We will be accepting 2020 Walker resident and non-resident returns by e-file. If you use a paid tax preparer that e-files your federal and state return, they will be able to e-file your Walker return also. If you use TaxAct software/online tax program to prepare your own federal and state returns, you will be able to e-file your Walker return. Visit the TaxAct site at taxact.com for more information.

Please note that other software/online tax programs used for self-prepared returns (TurboTax, H&R Block, TaxSlayer) do not participate with Michigan local e-filing.

E-filed returns for tax year 2020 will be accepted beginning February 12, 2021. Processing of e-filed returns with refunds will not begin until mid-March. All W-2 forms due from employers by February 28 must be processed first.

UPDATE FROM CITY ENGINEER, SCOTT CONNERS, P.E.

KINNEY AVENUE IMPROVEMENTS

During the summer of 2021 we will be working on a long overdue enhancement to Kinney Avenue from Waldorf Street north to Three Mile Road. We will be widening this section to three lanes and adding sidewalk. In addition to these improvements we were able to obtain a state grant to extend the trail system from within City Central Park up to Three Mile Road. The trail will start at Randall Avenue and go east approximately 600 feet to Kinney Avenue. It will then connect north to Three Mile Road.

The Kinney corridor is a critical part of our transportation system. We will be detouring traffic west to Wilson Avenue during the construction. It is our hope to start construction in early June, or immediately after the Kenowa Hills School system shuts down for the summer. The area will be closed to through traffic for the entire summer and into the fall. Local traffic (residents who live within the construction zone) will have access to their homes but it will be slow and, at times, messy. The reward will be new roadway with a center turn lane along with sidewalk on the west side and a 10 foot paved trail on the east side. 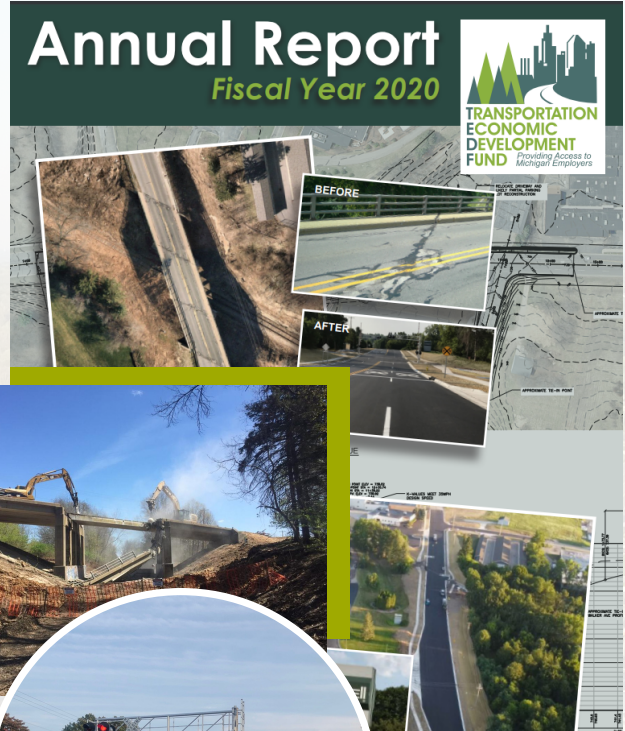
We continue to work with MDOT and the United States Department of Transportation on ways to connect this trail system with the Pioneer Trail just north of I-96 on Fruit Ridge Avenue. We hope to collaborate with our MDOT partners to find grant funding to rebuild this highway interchange and improve all the access points while allowing for pedestrian movements across the highway.



Infrastructure Highlights

WALKER AVENUE BRIDGE

The Walker Avenue bridge over the Coopersville-Marne Railroad has been at the top of Walker's infrastructure priority list for several years. The bridge was nearing the end of its useful life cycle. In addition to the degrading condition of the two-lane bridge, the City needed to widen the structure to help facilitate industrial growth at Bissell Homecare and further south on the old Trick Sand Mine. The cost for a new structure was estimated at over \$6 Million. State funding remained tight as the number of bridges around Michigan needed repairs. The best thing to do was remove the bridge to create an at-grade crossing. This removes a future liability from the bridge inventory and reduces Walker's long term maintenance cost for the bridge. The cost for this new project totaled just over \$3 million, reducing the City's cost by half of the original estimate. In addition, Walker was successful in obtaining \$1.7 million in grant dollars to assist with the project. The grant was the result of a partnership with Bissell Homecare and the Michigan Economic Development Corporation. The project was a huge financial success for the City of Walker by removing the biggest bridge liability and widening the roadway. For the local project stakeholders, the widening allowed for safer turning movements and dramatically increased visibility from intersections and driveways. The project was even featured in the Transportation Economic Development Fund's Annual Report.



NORTH RIDGE CONNECTION

The City of Walker's vision to extend North Ridge Drive from Walker Avenue to Fruit Ridge Avenue had been 25 years in the making. In late 2020, the City cut the ribbon on the finished connection. Prior to North Ridge West, North Ridge Drive served 7,300 feet of roadway without a secondary exit. This Visser Brothers development extended that cul-de-sac another 2,400 feet along with three more proposed cul-de-sacs totaling 3,200 feet. The City of Walker's North Ridge East project helped to close the gap by adding another 1,550 feet of public roadway across the Schwallier Orchard. This project was initiated to provide vital emergency response access for Police and Fire along with transportation redundancy for employees and visitors to this industrial corridor. One final phase is included in the Master Plan and will allow for connectivity and redundancy all the way to the intersection of Four Mile Road and Cordes Avenue. The overall connection from Fruit Ridge Avenue to Cordes Avenue will relieve congestion on Alpine Avenue, Four Mile Road, Three Mile Road, and allow enhanced access to I-96 at three potential interchanges.

LIBRARY JOURNAL NAMES KDL A STAR LIBRARY

For the third year in a row, Kent District Library has been recognized as one of America's Star Libraries, as rated by the Library Journal Index of Public Library Service. KDL was one of only two libraries in Michigan to receive this honor. The Ann Arbor District Library was also named a Star Library. Library Journal scored 5,608 public libraries and identified 262 star performers in 2020. Library scores are based on physical circulation, circulation of electronic materials, library visits, program attendance, public internet computer use, Wi-Fi sessions and e-retrievals. Libraries are ranked by category, based on operating expenditures, and the top libraries in each peer-group category are recognized as a Star Library. Libraries can earn up to five stars. This year, KDL earned a four-star ranking, up from a three-star ranking last year, reflecting increased value for people who are served by the library. Library Journal is the oldest and most respected publication covering the library field. The Star Library designation began in 2008.

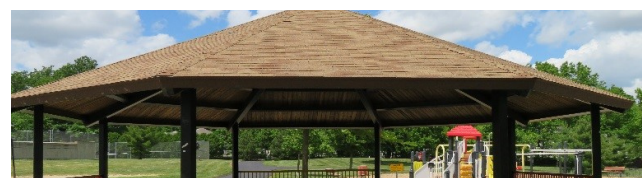

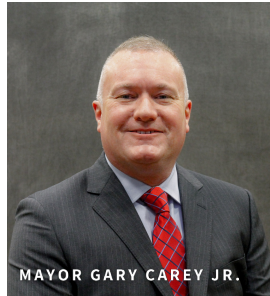
